The *Lenten Season* is moving right along....we are in the third week already. Hopefully, our prayer, fasting and almsgiving are helping us in our Lenten journey. Each of these practices is focused on a relationship in our lives.... almsgiving directs us to others, prayer directs us to

God and fasting directs us to ourselves. Lent is a time to reexamine all our relationships, our priorities and our time spent. May our Lenten practices truly renew us bringing us newness in our spiritual life as we jour-

ney to the great feast of life!

In today's Gospel, we hear the story of Jesus driving out the moneychangers from the temple and spilling their coins as he overturned their tables. We might think that Jesus is simply throwing out "the bad guys" who have committed some kind of sacrilege against the temple by buying and selling sheep, oxen, and doves. But that's not true, because those merchants were not actually bad guys. In fact, those who sold animals and the moneychangers were part of the temple system. The people's religious practice required that they sacrifice those animals to God. Those who sold the animals for sacrifice were actually providing a service for those who came to the temple to worship. They were helping the worshippers obey the rules of the temple. The Gospel therefore is reminding us that being a good Christian means more than simply "keeping the command-ments." Jesus challenges us to go beyond such a limited way of thinking. That sense of the letter of the law or simply having "done our duty" is not what the Christian life is about. Being a good Christian means that our "duty" is never really completed until the day we stand before God. True Christian love will continually ask more of us each day, that is, more than the precepts of the law command. The Christian life is an immersion into an endless journey of self-sacrificing love in a continuous process of being converted toward God's love. It means seeing every gift and ability we have as an opportunity to help others. It means no less than imitating Christ himself who was always ready to pour out his life for the sake of others, even to the point of going to the cross. The forty days of Lent invite us to respond to the challenge of Jesus to go further. Is my prayer and fasting and charitable works in this season helping me to go beyond where I have been in the past? The Lord has replaced the old law of the commandments with the new law of love. It's a love that never stops growing, a love that trusts in God through every difficulty, and a love that is based on the risk of faith. It's a love that finds new and better ways to be faithful, and a love that sees every person as our neighbor. It is that law of love of which today's responsorial psalm speaks: "The law of the Lord is perfect, refreshing the soul...the precepts of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart." That rejoicing will lead us to the Resurrection.

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I am the Lord your God ... You shall not have other gods beside me. -Ex 20:2-3

One of the greatest golfers of all time - if not the greatest - was Jack Nicklaus. Which is why it is baffling that at the beginning of each season he would return to his childhood coach and re-learn how to grip the golf club. It's like Shakespeare re-learning the alphabet and grammar. Why would he do that? Because Jack knew that the fundamentals are always relevant. Perfecting and obsessing over his grip allowed him to do everything else in the game well. In sports and life, the best ones love the basics.

Similarly, as we begin Lent, we re-learn the spiritual basics in the Ten Commandments. Consider the first, to "have no other gods besides me." This is our "grip." Is our connection to God one of absolute fidelity and exclusive worship? Am I willing to let go of my precious idols, the things I cling to instead of God? Once we say "yes" to this fundamental question of our spiritual "grip," then we are ready to properly engage with everything else in life. Watch how beautifully the game of life unfolds in the next nine commandments (numbered in parentheses); how we speak to God and others (2 and 8), how we organize our week (3), how we relate to our family (4) and the wider community (5 and 7), how we live our sexuality (6), and how we order all the other desires of the human heart (9 and 10). But don't rush to these later Commandments too soon! Everything in life is built on the first Commandment. The more we focus on worshiping God alone, the better we navigate the complexity of life with panache, effectiveness, and love.

Lenten challenge: This week, identify what you can do to better worship God alone. If you're not sure, scan the last nine commandments to identify what you are most likely to worship instead of God. Power, pleasure, control of your time, possessions, family, health, reputation, money? Commit to concrete action to help you let go of this "idol" to better hold on to God alone in faithful worship. Remember: the best love the basics.

Today we conclude the final part of the Mass, called the Concluding Rite. The Concluding Rite continues into the Prayer After Communion. The priest engages the congregation by saying, "The Lord be with you." The congregation responds, "and with your spirit." The priest then says, "May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit." (While blessing us with the sign of the cross). The congregation responds, "Amen." The priest or deacon dismisses the congregation with the words, "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life;" There are other dismissal options the priest or deacon may use. A very simple dismissal is "Go in peace." During the seasons of Advent, Lent, Christmas, Easter, or on Solemnities, the priest may opt to give us a "Solemn Blessing." A Solemn Blessing is always preceded by the words, "Bow down for the blessing" by the priest or deacon. A solemn blessing is usually a set of three prayers of blessing. To each prayer, the congregation responds, "amen." After the final blessing and the dismissal, our tradition at St. Michael, St. Joseph the Worker and Blessed Trinity parish is to pray the prayer to St. Michael the Archangel together. The priest and deacon then reverence the altar with a kiss, and then genuflect in front of the altar, with the altar servers. A recessional hymn is sung while the priest, deacon, and altar servers process to the narthex (vestibule). The celebration of Mass is concluded. I hope this weekly column assisted you in growing to love and appreciate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Sincerely, Father Felician
